# Exclusive Interview with Anne Cassidy

## Short Bio

Anne Cassidy was born in London in 1952, and worked for some years as a teacher, before becoming a full-time writer. She specializes in crime stories and thrillers for teenagers, and has written a series of East End Murder books.

Her books also include *Missing Judy* (2002), the story of Kim, whose sister Judy has been missing for six years, and *Looking for JJ* (2004). JJ is Jennifer Jones, a girl who is released after serving a sentence for manslaughter for a crime she committed when she was ten years old. This book was shortlisted for the 2004 Whitbread Children's Book Award and won the Booktrust Teenage Prize.

Two of her most recent books are *Innocent* (2006), *The Story of my Life* (2007), the story of Kevin, a teenage boy who is drawn into crime and the *Murder Notebook Series*.

### What's your favourite book of all time?

There are lots of books I love. I read them over every few years.

My favourite genre of book is the Crime genre. This is why I've written so many crime books.

My favourite book among those that I've written is *LOOKING FOR JJ* which a lot of people still like.



### Who or what inspired you to write?

I read a lot of books during my 20s and one day I wondered whether I'd be good enough to try and write one. A voice in my head said, *Don't be ridiculous – you were in trouble a lot at school – you were no good at English! Of course you couldn't write a book!* I ignored that voice.

### If you couldn't be an author what would you be?

Something creative; a dressmaker, maybe. My mum made lots of her own clothes. I wasn't very good at it because I couldn't thread the machine. I might be able to now!

### What are you reading at the moment?

A book called *The Lamplighters* by Emma Stonex – its about three men who work on a lighthouse and vanish without any explanation. I've only just started it but so far it's really good.

### Are we allowed to know what your next book will be about?

My next book is for slightly younger readers. It's called *THE DROWNING DAY* and will be published in spring 2022. It's a story about kids in the future struggling to live in a very different world to the one we live in now.

The John Rylands Library was founded by Enriqueta Rylands in memory of her husband John Rylands, who died in 1888.

The John Rylands Library is one of the finest examples of neo-Gothic architecture in Europe and is indisputably one of the great libraries of the world. The library became part of The University of Manchester in 1972. It now houses the majority of Special Collections of The University of Manchester Library, the third largest academic library in the United Kingdom. of important projects.




